

**Public Hearing on Kentucky Municipal Road Aid and
Local Government Economic Aid funding
July 19, 2017**

Mayor Irvin T. "Butch" Callery called the July 19, 2017 City of Villa Hills Public Hearing to order at 6:15 p.m. at the Dennis M. Stein Municipal Building, 719 Rogers Road, Villa Hills, Kentucky. Mayor Callery asked Mr. Bohman to take the roll. Those in attendance:

A quorum was present

City Administrator/Clerk Craig Bohman read the Special Meeting notice for the public hearing into the record.

City Administrator/Clerk Bohman noted that Villa Hills anticipates receiving \$140,000 in Kentucky Municipal Road Aid in FY 2017-2018 and carrying forward \$96,000 from last fiscal year. He presented that KMA funds would be used for asphalt overlay, full depth full repair, drainage projects, concrete panel replacement, signage, crack sealing, snow removal and salting, line painting, sidewalk, curb and gutter repairs or replacements, lighting, catch basin repair or installation, patching, installation or repair of ADA ramps at intersections, and debt service for loans or leases taken to make improvements to roads. He noted that KMA funds could be spent on any road or street within the city's incorporated boundary.

Mr. Bohman noted that the Local Government Economic Assistance program was commonly called coal severance funds. Counties that produce coal or have coal trucks transporting coal through them receive LGEA funds and the funds are shared with cities. Mr. Bohman reported that, while not expecting any LGEA funds, such funds received by the city will be used as a part of the city's street program including mass transit systems, streets, and roads as allowed by KRS 42.455(2)(c).

Ms. Koenig inquired if coal severance included coal that travels via barge on the river. Mr. Bohman stated he did not know if barge tonnage was included in coal severance funds and would check.


The floor was opened for public comments by Mayor Callery. There were no public comments.


